




I'm in the middle of rewriting my romantic historical suspense story, The Cursed Bloodline, that I published in 2016. The past 5 years I've grown a lot as a writer, so I thought that it's about time to revisit the old story.

In my early books, <u>The Ancestor's Secrets</u> series (2012), which is next on my needs-rewriting-list, I had a tendency to keep going on and on about parts that didn't really move the story forward, but later on my writing style turned into a more minimalist scene and character description.

What is your opinion?

Personally, when I read a story, I get easily annoyed by extremely detailed descriptions.

If the story plays out in present time and the author describes the character's outfit in minute details, it doesn't even give me a chance to use my imagination. This is not from an actual book, but I've read something similar:

She had shoulder length, platinum blond curly hair. She was tall and skinny with long legs. Her face oval shaped, sky-blue eyes large with long lashes. She stood in front of the walk-in closet selecting her outfit for the meeting. She chose a teal-blue knee length dress that accentuated her womanly curves. You get the picture. For me, it's too long and way too detailed.

The story with medicine became our routine. One morning, because I didn't remember any more fairy tales that I had read as a child, I started telling him my childhood memories.


One of my fondest memories was how my best friend and I saved four drowning kittens when a cruel neighbor threw them into the river.

Meet the Nyms By A.L. Butcher

English is a curious, complex, and crazy language. Not least of which are the *-nyms*.

You may use these in everyday language and not give a second thought unless you're like me – a wordsmith and amateur etymologist – and such curiosities intrigue you.

Many of us have heard the term 'Synonym' - but what does it mean?

Synonym

A word or phrase that means exactly or nearly the same as another word or phrase in the same language, for example shut is a synonym of close.

Examples:

Shut / Close*

Far / Distant

Evil / Wicked / Bad / Malevolent

Push / Shove

Jump / Leap

Create / Make

Near / Close*

*See examples below as Close (as in near) and Close (as in close a door) are also *Homonyms*.

It's likely you've used homonyms regularly but might not have been aware that's what they were called.

What is a **Homonym?**

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
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


Dystopian love story by Erika M Szabo

She also writes historical fiction, like the Amazon.co.uk best selling Aquila et Noctua, and paranormal suspensse.




Erika M Szabo
